Farmhouse. Late C18. Brick in English Garden Wall Bond. Stone slate roof. T-plan. 2 storeys plus attic, 3 bays with single-storey, 3-bay wings. 6-panel door in late C19 gabled wood porch. Renewed 12-pane casements in original openings with wedge lintels and projecting sills. Steeply-pitched roof with reverse-stepped gables and corniced brick end stacks. 3 hipped dormers.

Wing on right has two 12-pane sashes and a blank quatrefoil with painted imitation window. On right return a Gothic bay window with arched heads to windows and intersecting glazing bars.

Bought by Dobbies Garden Centres in the 1990s and converted into a pub called The BADGER, now managed by Vintage Inns

House: 6-panel door in raised surround with moulded edge and date carved in relief on lintel. On ground floor original sashes with intermediate glazing bars removed. 16-pane sashes on 1st floor. Cottage has C20 4-pane sashes in raised surrounds. Stone brackets below eaves. Gabled roof with flat coping and banded end stacks.

To right a 2-bay section with 8-Pane Yorkshire sashes. To left the 1-bay brick section in English Garden Wall Bond, with half-shuttered windows. (Next to Waggon Inn)

House. Mid C18 and later. Brick facade in Flemish bond. Other walls in English Garden Wall Bond. One rear facade ashlar. Welsh slate roof. Front block with parallel range to rear and left, and double-span wing projecting to rear forming an overall L-plan. 2 storeys.

South front is in 2 sections. Main block 5 bays. 3 steps up to central Venetian doorway with Tuscan columns, set in blank arch. 12- and 4-pane sashes with flat arches and projecting sills. Hipped roof with corniced ridge stack. Lower block recessed to left is contiguous with rear span; irregular fenestration including a round-headed window with radial glazing bars.

East front, on right return: lower 4-bay facade. In 2nd bay a 6-panel door and overlight with radial glazing bars, in architrave with cornice on fluted brackets.

Rear: a 5-bay facade in C18 ashlar.

Former cottage, now a garage, attached to rear has tumbled-in brickwork in the gable.

Interior has mid C18 open-well stair with turned balusters and panelled dado; 6-panel doors and shutters.



Benridge Hall south front

12/286 Gateway approx 440 yds east of Benridge Hall II Gatepiers, gate and screen walls. Late C18 or early C19.

Ashlar. Gate iron. Round corniced piers with fluted necking and domed caps, flanked by quadrant walls ending in lower piers with domed caps.


Coach house. Late C18. Rendered brick with ashlar quoins. Welsh slate roof. 2 elliptical arches with boarded double doors and roundel over. Stepped gable above.

Cottage. 1803 dated over door. Brick in English Garden Wall bond. Welsh slate roof. 2-storey, 3 bay cottage with attached cartshed which has now (mid C20) been incorporated into house.

Original cottage, to left, has central half-glazed door in stone surround with scalloped decoration in the lintel and date and intials W D 1803. Flanking 16-pane casements. On 1st floor-3 small ogee-headed windows with Y-tracery. To right 3 blocked segmental arches now with C20 12-pane windows. Hipped roof with old brick ridge stack.



NZ 17 NE PONTELAND BERWICK HILL 12/287 South-East Farmhouse and cottage with attached cartshed

House and cottage. c.1840 with C18 core. Ashlar with Welsh slate roof. T-plan house with L-plan cottage attached to right.

House: 2 storeys, 3 bays. Central boarded and battened door with small-paned overlight. Renewed 16-pane sash windows. Gabled roof with corniced end stacks.

Cottage: 2 windows with 4-panel door to left and 4 renewed 16-pane sashes. Gabled roof with corniced right end stack.

Cartshed attached on right: single storey, 5 bays with square piers and lintels.

Rear wing of house has older squared masonry and C18 kneelers. Outshut has three 12-pane Yorkshire sashes and a cartouche dated 1723.

House: 2 storeys, 2 bays with panelled door and 4-pane sashes. Gabled roof with banded end stacks.

A rare example of a dated smithy.

NZ 16 NW PONTELAND BIRNEY HALL 20/288 Birney Hall GV II

House. C17 or early C18 reset datestone of 1701 with initials R & ME possibly for Errington, above centre bay; altered and extended 1907. Ashlar with Welsh slate roof. Tudor style. Original double-span building to left "2?/z storeys, 3 bays. Openings mainly of 1907. Central canted 2-storey bay has Tudor-arched doorway with hoodmould. 5-light mullioned window over. Flanking 4-light mullioned-and-transomed windows on ground floor, 3-light above. 3 tall original gabled dormers have diamond-paned casements with wedge lintels grooved in imitation of voussoirs. Steeply-pitched gabled roof with C18 kneelers, flat coping and corniced end stacks.

2-bay extension to right of 1907 in similar style. Good interior of 1907.

Rear span has C18 masonry, but detail of 1907 in Arts and Crafts style. Large 2-storey wood bow window and projecting wing on left with 3 attached Good interior of 1907. Tuscan columns supporting jettied first floor.

Gate, gatepiers, walls and railings. Early C18. Rusticated piers with pulvinated friezes, cornices, and ball finials on cushion bases. Low quadrant walls topped by railings with top rail and pointed standards ending in lower, rusticated, corniced piers with obelisk finials. Double gates with dog rail, arched top rail and spearhead standards.

11/450 and 12/450 Benridge Hall 28.4.59 GV II

House. Mid C18 and later. Brick facade in Flemish bond. Other walls in English Garden Wall Bond. One rear facade ashlar. Welsh slate roof. Front block with parallel range to rear and left, and double-span wing projecting to rear forming an overall L-plan. 2 storeys.

South front is in 2 sections. Main block 5 bays. 3 steps up to central Venetian doorway with Tuscan columns, set in blank arch. 12- and 4-pane sashes with flat arches and projecting sills. Hipped roof with corniced ridge stack. Lower block recessed to left is contiguous with rear span; irregular fenestration including a round-headed window with radial glazing bars.

East front, on right return: lower 4-bay facade. In 2nd bay a 6-panel door and overlight with radial glazing bars, in architrave with cornice on fluted brackets.

Rear: a 5-bay facade in C18 ashlar.

Former cottage, now a garage, attached to rear has tumbled-in brickwork in the gable.

Interior has mid C18 open-well stair with turned balusters and panelled dado; 6-panel doors and shutters.



Benridge Hall south front

20/297 Forge Cottage also known as Birney Hill Farmhouse. Southern side of Stamfordham Road GV II

House. 1837. Ashlar with Welsh slate roof. 2 storeys, 3 bays. Central flush panelled door with 5-pane overlight. 12-pane sashes in alternating-block surrounds. Stone eaves. Gabled roof with flat coping. Corniced right end stack of 3 conjoined shafts. Rendered left end stack. Catslide roof to rear.

Dated on lintel of central Ist-floor window.



WINDMILL C18. Dressed stone. Roof not visible. Circular with tapering side: 3 storeys. Half-glazed door and several small square 4-pane windows. Disused and without its sails at time of survey.







Engraved on a central stone on the south side are the words GUIDE WELL 17 BIRNEY HILL 27

The sails for this windmill were long gone but it was still used as a residence until the 1950s.

NZ 17 SW PONTELAND DISSINGTON HALL

16/291 Dissington Hall 27 8 52 formerly listed as North Dissington Hall GV II*

Country house. 1794 by William Newton for Edward Collingwood. Ashlar with Lakeland slate roof. Main block and 2 lower service wings to rear forming U-plan. 3 storeys, 7 bays with central 3-storey canted bay.


12-pane sash windows. Plinth, ground floor sill band, string above ground floor and dentil cornice. Blocking course probably added slightly later. Hipped roof with 2 tall stacks with modillion cornices.

5-bay returns with similar detail. Doorway on right return at junction with rear wing, in Greek-style porch of c.1820.

Wing on east side has 12-pane sashes; wing on west side a Venetian window with Diocletian window over. To rear a large Venetian stair window.

Interior: Staircase hall has screen of 2 Ionic columns in antis on ground floor, Corinthian columns on 1st floor; imperial stair with iron stick balusters; Adam-style Venetian window. Garden room (behind the bay window) is octagonal with frieze of triglyphs and metopes with achievements of arms; guttae panels in the cornice; grey marble fireplace with Ionic columns and a relief head in the frieze. Dining room has white marble fireplace with palmette frieze and detached terms, each with a lion emerging from acanthus leaves which in turn grow from a large, Iion's foot; palmette frieze. Library has white marble fireplace, the frieze carved with cornucopia and Pheobus in his chariot, flower vases on the jambs. Good doors and doorcases throughout with fluted friezes, paterae, and cornices, original door furniture.

Architect's plans and drawings preserved in the house.

Stable block attached to north of Dissington Hall II

Stable block, c.1794 extended and altered 1824 (date on rainwater head). Ashlar with Lakeland slate roof; brick left range.

2-storey central block forms inner courtyard with 2 single-storey ranges linking with service wings of house, and outer courtyard with 2 further ranges attached to north side.

Inner courtyard: centre block 3 bays with round-headed carriage arch in pedimented central bay; Venetian window over arch and clock in pediment; flanking half-slatted windows. Brick single-storey range to left, stone to right with boarded doors and 12-pane sashes; also one tripartite window.

Outer courtyard: dentre block has irregular openings including 16-pane sashes and Yorkshire sashes; also 2 segmental arches with boarded double doors. Single storey 8-bay range to right has 2 boarded doors and 12-pane sashes. 2-storey carriage house to rear has 2 segmental arches





NZ 17 SW PONTELAND DISSINGTON

16/293 GV Terrace wall and railings to south of Dissington Hall II

Terrace retaining wall and railings. 1794 by William Newton. Ashlar and iron.

In front of the house a low wall with moulded coping flanked by railings which have 4 rails and newels with acanthus scrolls and palmette finials.



House. Early C18 with earlier core; front altered early C19. Squared stone with Welsh slate roof. 2 storeys, 7 bays. In 5th bay a 6-panelled door with overlight in Tuscan entablature. 4-pane sashes with projecting sills. Steeply-pitched gabled roof with C18 kneelers. Banded end and ridge stacks.

Rear projecting cross-gabled stair wing on left has renewed 16-pane sashes and C18 kneelers. To right a stair and kitchen wing, parallel to front range, also has renewed 16-pane sashes and C18 kneelers.

Interior has 2 early C18 open-well staircases with thick turned balusters and moulded handrails. Staircase at east end of house has boldly wreathed handrail. Large C17 fireplace with stop-chamfered elliptical arch. 2- and 6-panelled doors, panelled shutters and reveals.

NZ 17 SE (23 PONTELAND ELAND HALL 17/302 28.4.69 GV II

Garden wall and dovecote attached to east of Eland Hall

Garden wall and dovecote. Early C18. Brick in English Garden Wall Bond, with random rubble to rear. Pantiled roof. Wall c.15 ft. high and 20 yards long links house with 2-storey square dovecote. Potting shed on ground floor. Segmental-arched opening on 1st floor, and pyramidal roof. Brick nesting boxes inside.





NZ 17 NW PONTELAND HIGHAM DYKES 11/30 Higham Dykes 27.8.52 GV II

House. Late C17 extended late C18 or early C19. Brick in English Garden Wall Bond. Graduated Lakeland slate roof. Double-span main block with lower wing projecting to rear forming L-plan.

Front is in 2 sections. Main block: 2 storeys plus attics, 5 bays. 4 moulded steps up to 2-leaf half-glazed door in late C18 wood surround with attached Tuscan columns, dentil cornice and pediment. Long narrow windows in thin roll-moulded wood surrounds with projecting sills and wedge lintels. Ground floor has renewed 2-pane sashes, 12-pane sashes above. 1st floor string. Steeply-pitched roof with Flemish gables and 5 segment-headed dormers with 12-pane casements. End stacks.

East wing, recessed on right return, is contiguous with rear span and is in different and later brick. 3 windows. On ground floor small irregular later windows. Stone 1st floor sill band and 12-pane sashes in similar surrounds to main block, possibly re-used from rear. Gabled roof with early C19 Flemish gable on right. 3 dormers.

Rear facade is irregular. In the centre the original narrow stair projection with tall round-headed window, band and Flemish gable. Round this the rear span was built in several stages. It has 12-pane sashes to right and 16-pane sashes to left. Early C20 brick porch with shaped gable. Lower service wing to left is also of several builds. 3 C19 Flemish gables.

Interior: late C19 imitation C17 staircase. An Art Nouveau fireplace with 7 painted gesso figures representing the arts and abstract virtues. Several 2-panelled doors, including one impressive former external door in kitchen. Stout ceiling beams in kitchen.



NZ 17 NW PONTELAND HIGHAM DYKES 11/306 GVSundial approx 30 yds south of Higham Dykes

Grade II Pedestal sundial. Dated EFF. Painted sandstone.

1728 Moulded base, then a corniced square block with fielded panels, the south side dated. Above, a tapering, square, fluted column. Small gnomon.

NZ 17 NW PONTELAND HIGHAM DYKES 11/304

Stable and carriage house attached to north-west of Higham Dykes II GV

Stable and carriage house. C18. Brick in English Garden Wall Bond. Stone slate and pantiled roof. Single storey, 6 bays. In the centre a 3-bay stable with boarded door and flanking casement windows. To left boarded double doors to carriage house. Similar opening to right later filled in, now has sash window with intermediate glazing bars removed. Steeply-pitched roof with pantiles over left bay, stone slate elsewhere. Obelisk finials to gables.





String course. Pyramidal roof with square stack rising from north-west corner. 1st floor has 12-pane sashes on the other sides. Garden wall: flat coping.originally c.9 ft. high; raised later in different brick with flat coping.

Single-storey farm building attached to left has 1 elliptical arch in gabled end. Boarded door and casement window on right return.

Gateway. Early C19. Ashlar. Round corniced piers with domed caps. Quadrant walls with flat coping, ending in lower similar piers.





NZ 17 SE PONTELAND HIGH CALLERTON 17/310 Oriel House and Coach House GV II

2 houses, formerly the stable block and service wing of GaUerton hall (q.v.). Built by William Maughan C18, extensively remodelled 1892 by R. Norman Shaw. Rendered stone with some ashlar dressings. Lakeland slate roofs. L-plan. 2 storeys, irregular fenestration.

Garden front: projecting wing to left has broad elliptical carriage arch with keystone. In the re-entrant angle an oriel window with multi-moulded wood cornice. Main part has C20 sashes and casements on ground floor; above are two 6-pane sashes in half dormers with multi-moulded wood pediments. Cross-gabled right bay. Gabled and hipped roofs with banded, rendered stacks.

Entrance side: similar detail; also an early C18 Gibbs surround.

Rear of projecting wing (i.e. towards Callerton Hall) has large blocked elliptical carriage arch in raised ashlar surround with large coat of arms; three 12-pane sashes over. Gabled roof with C18 lead figure on the kneeler.

East wall starts with higher section containing round-headed doorway with small baluster colonettes in recesses in the middle of each jamb. Ramped down on right to lower section which has random rubble base, moulded coping and balustrade. Similar walling continues half way along south side to gateway with naturalistic wroughtiron gate, and then continues as solid wall.

NZ 17 SE PONTELAND HIGH CALLERTON 17/312

Callerton House 28.4.69 GV II

House. Dated 1724. Ashlar with Welsh slate roof. 2 storeys, 5 bays. Central 6-panelled door with overlight in dated raised surround. Oval panel above with initials I.F. Windows to right of door are stone crosses in raised surrounds. Windows to left of door have similar surrounds but have lost their crosses. They have 4-pane sashes. 1st floor band. Steeply-pitched gabled roof with flat coping, kneelers and end stacks.

Cottage. C17 - early C18. Roughly-dressed stone with Welsh slate roof. 2 storeys, 3 windows. On ground floor, boarded door to left, inserted 8-pane casement in centre and 12-pane sash to right. On1st floor a 9-pane sash and two 6-pane casements. Steeply-pitched roof. Additional section to left, formerly a farm building, has boarded door and two C20 half-dormers above. Walls 30-36 inches thick.

Rebellion House 27 g 52

(formerly listed

House. C16, altered early C17. Random rubble with walls 4 ft. thick. Welsh slate roof. 2 storeys, 3 irregular bays. C20 panelled door in C17 Tudor-arched surround with hoodmould. To left a small 2-light double-chamfered window with hoodmould. To right a similar C20 window. Small C20 window above. Gabled roof with renewed end stacks.

Original Ist-floor doorway, now a window, on left return; right of it a gun loop with internal splay.

South (garden) side has two C20 mullioned windows, also a ventilation slit. On first floor 3 small windows in old openings with old wood lintels.

Interior: on ground floor large C17 fireplace with finely moulded surround, the lintel supported on moulded corbels. Old beams.

On 1st floor: huge C16 fireplace with old wood lintel on very large, rough, rounded corbels; relieving arch over. Left of this the old wood lintel of the lst-floor doorway, and the splayed gun loop. 2-bay upper-cruck roof with collar beams, saddles and double ridge pieces.

The house was probably a C16 bastlehouse with accommodation extended to the ground floor in the early-mid C17.

It has a traditional association with Cromwell who is said to have stayed here

To rear: porte-cochere with square Tuscan columns; entrance has segmental-arched doorway in bolection-moulded surround with keystone carved with Ogle crest. Flanking windows have re-used lintels: to left inscribed CO DO with Ogle shields; 16 32 to right JSO CHO also with shields. Rainwater heads dated 1764 for Newton Ogle.

NZ 17 NE PONTELAND KIRKLEY HALL 12/315 Bank Head House GV II

House. Mid C18. Brick in English Garden Wall Bond. Welsh slate roof. 2 storeys, 3 bays with C20 panelled door in small gabled wood porch. 4-pane sashes on ground floor, renewed 12-pane above. Flat arches. 1st floor brick string. Steeply-pitched roof with flat coping and tumbled-in brickwork in the gables. Corniced end stacks, the right one rendered.





NZ 17 NE PONTELAND KIRKLEY HALL

12/316 Farm buildings attached to west of Bank Head House GV II

Shelter sheds, byre and dovecote. Mid C18. Brick in English Garden Wall Bond with pantiled roofs. L-plan. To right, single-storey, 4-bay shelter shed with segmental brick arches, 3 now blocked. Projecting to left, first a single-storey, 3-bay byre; then a 2-storey Gothick dovecote with pointed-arched door, blocked pointed-arched window on 1st floor and castellated parapet, stepped up at corners.

PONTELAND KIRKLEY HALL 12/318 28.4.69 GV Stable block at Kirkley Hall II

Stable block. 1764 for Newton Ogle. Rendered with ashlar plinth and archway. Graduated Lakeland slate roof. 1: 3: 1 bays. Single-storey central section: central elliptical carriage arch with rusticated surround and pediment bearing arms of Ogle family. Flanking 12-pane sashes in architraves.

2-storey end pavilions. Right pavilion has 12-pane sash in architrave on ground floor and similar 6-pane sash above. Left pavilion has large early C19 tripartite window on ground floor; 6-pane sash above. Pavilions have pyramidal roofs. Above the centre bay a clock with Tuscan drum and lead dome. Soffit of archway has coffered plaster tunnel vault. On left return, early C19 conservatory. Single storey, 4 bays divided by Tuscan pilasters. 2-leaf, 6 panel door with overlight and semicircular hood, in 5th bay. 12-pane sashes in shallow reveals with flat arches. 1st floor brick band. Gabled roof with flat coping, right end stack and 3 segment-headed dormer windows.

2-storey lean-to to rear has irregular openings with 12-pane sashes, Yorkshire sashes and 16-pane sashes.

Interior has late C18 stair with stick balusters. 2 early C18 panelled rooms (one in added 2-bay left section). Both have 2-panelled doors and wood cornices. One has fireplace with bolection-moulded surround and round-headed niche with shaped shelves.

End stacks renewed on right. C20 rear additions not of special Interest





NZ 17 SW PONTELAND MEDBURN 16/358 Garden walls at Dissington Old Hall GV II

Walled garden. Early C17. Random rubble with some ashlar remnants of demolished house built into north-east corner. Doorway, on east side, with Tudor-arched lintel and multi-moulded surround. The east wall has steeply-ridged coping with roll-moulded top. The other walls have flat coping.

NZ 17 SW PONTELAND MEDBURN 16/359 Old Dissington Farmhouse 27.8.52 GV II

Farmhouse, c.1840. Dressed stone with ashlar dressings. Welsh slate roof. 2 storeys, 3 bays. Rusticated quoins. 



Open porch of paired Roman Doric columns. Tripartite doorway with segmental fanlight and radial glazing bars. 12-pane sashes on ground floor, 6-pane above. Plinth, sill strings and panelled 1st floor band. Moulded eaves cornice. Higher main block to right has 12-pane sashes on both floors. Similar detail. West front, i.e. above roof of linking range is pedimented. Stable block to left also has similar detail. Shallow-pitched hipped roofs. Tall entrance tower on west side over round-headed pedimented carriage arch; slightly-recessed upper stage has angle pilasters, cornice> blocking course and lead dome.Interior: Hall has 2 fireplaces - one, wood of c.1750, Rococo style; the other white marble of c.1800.Oval anteroom with domed roof light leads to full-height rotunda with Ist-floor iron balustrade and dome with roof light; curved scagliola fireplace and seven doors in curved entablatures. Drawing room has one shallow curved wall. Deep classical frieze and multi-moulded cornice; carved wood fireplace. Circular domed lobby leads to octagonal library with built-in shelves and white marble fireplace with Ionic columns and classical scene. Oval staircase hall has iron stick balusters to cantilevered spiral stair, and domed ceiling with roof light. Several other oval and semi-oval rooms. Good friezes, cornices, doors, fireplaces and shutters throughout.

To right a projecting 3-storey gabled frontispiece, blank on ground floor and oversailing above on 2 large rounded corbels. Two 2-light double-chamfered mullioned windows above, with strings rising to form hoodmoulds. Gabled roof with kneelers.

Between these projections a C20 door and, on 1st floor a 2-light window with hoodmould and panel above inscribed M:E: for Mark Errington.

3-bay attached house to right has central gabled porch with round-headed door in architrave. Stone slate roof. M.E. inscribed'on lintel of original Tudor-arched doorway within. Flanking canted bay windows and 2-light windows above have double-chamfered surrounds. This detail is now all C19.

On left return '4-light mullioned windows with hoodmoulds on ground aid first floors. 2-light window above.

Interior of tower has tunnel-vaulted ground floor and a large C17 fireplace; the lintel carved with crenellations.

Tower: C12. West door with one order of columns and chevron moulding in the arch. 2 small original windows above. Several other C12 windows on returns also several C14 cusped windows. Bell stage added C14.

Nave and aisles. 3 bays. Vestiges of C12 masonry; extended C13 (see masonry at west end) and again in C15. South aisle has two 3-light segmental-headed Perpendicular windows. South porch C13, reset; slightly-pointed doorway; pointed tunnel vault inside with 3 chamfered transverse ribs. North aisle rebuilt 1810 using old masonry. Low parapets and shallow-pitched roofs.

Transepts: South transept rebuilt late C15 with Perpendicular east window. North transept C13, the gable rebuilt in C19; 3 tall lancets on north and east sides.

Chancel: Long C13 chancel with chamfered sill string rising to form hood mould over segmental priest's door. 2 original lancets on north side, C14 Decorated windows elsewhere.

Interior: C15 south arcade with octagonal piers and double-chamfered arches dying into imposts. Similar north arcade of 1810. C13 chancel arch has re-cut corbels of Adam and Eve, before the fall on the south, after the fall on the north. North transept north windows have shouldered rere-lintels; the east windows have shouldered rere-arches. C14 glass fragments in chancel window heads. Trefoiled piscina in frame of dogtooth.

Many wall monuments, including:- Richard Newton Ogle, 1794 by Coade; John Dixon, 1716 - extremely rustic; Anne Byne, mother, and Anne Byne, daughter 1769 and no date, with interesting inscriptions.





House: 2 storeys plus attics, 3 bays with single-storey 1-bay side wings. Central 2-leaf, 6-panel door, and fanlight with radiating glazing bars under semicircular hood. Canted 5-sided bay windows on ground floor with 12- and 8-pane sashes. 12-pane sashes above. Dentil cornice. High hipped roof with 2 hipped dormers and tall corniced lateral stacks. Single-storey wings have 12-pane sashes; canted bay windows on returns.

Single-storey 6-bay linking range to rear has 12-pane sashes.

Tall, square water tower with cornice, large stone water spouts at corners and tall parapet with scalloped top.

Workshops for cottage homes. 1903 for the Newcastle Board of Guardians. Now Police workshops. Cavity walls with stretcher bond brick. Welsh slate roof. 3 ranges forming U-plan. Single-storey, 5x3 bays. 2-light windows in moulded wood surrounds. 12-pane sash in each light. Hipped roof with 2 corniced stacks. 2 boarded doors, and boarded double doors to rear.

Included for group value and historical interest as a survival of industrial training for boys in care.

Water tower in garden of Pine Dene (formerly listed as Windmill in grounds of Pine Dene)

Water tower; at time of survey being converted into house. Early C20. Brick in stretcher bond. Bituminous tile roof. Built in form of windmill. Round, 5 storeys with strongly tapering profile. Small 4-pane segmental-headed windows. Wood balcony at 1st floor level. Domed roof.

Tower now derelict. Windows missing, plaster or render falling off. Present owners have lived in adjoining house for twelve years.

House. 1815 by John Dobson. Tooled-and-margined ashlar with plinth. Scottish slate roof. Greek Revival style. Square with lower 2-storey service wing projecting to rear on left return and conservatory projecting to rear on right. 2 storeys, 3 bays. 8 swept steps with side railings which are wreathed around ashlar piers. 2-leaf, half-glazed door in recessed porch with Doric antae and cornice. 12-pane margined sashes with moulded sills on ground floor. 1st floor sill band and 6-pane margined sashes. Cornice and blocking course. Hipped roof with 2 large ridge stacks.

To rear: doorway into service wing has pedimented Doric entablature. Large 24-pane margined sash stair window.

Interior: Entrance hall; screen of 2 Doric columns. Cast iron balusters said to have been brought from elsewhere. Plain stone door surrounds framed by incised line ending Greek key patterns. Coffered ceiling with triglyph frieze.

Dining room: Ornate plaster ceiling with wreaths of vines and ivy; multi-moulded frieze and cornice. White marble fireplace with round arch and keystone carved with vines; vines in the spandrels also. 2 doorcases (one framing a niche) with fluted pilasters, elaborate brackets, palmette friezes and enriched cornices. This niche and the larger serving niche have elaborate Rococo-style built-in tables. The serving niche has fluted surround and large built-in mirror in frame of palmettes, gilded pelmet.

Sitting room has similar elaborate ceiling. Wood fireplace with frieze of scrolls and shells.

Study has stone fireplace with colonettes and square dentil capitals; pedimented lintel with acroteria; coat of arms in the pediment and foliage in the acroteria.

House, c.1840. Ashlar with plinth. Welsh slate roof. T-plan. 2 storeys, 3 bays. Rusticated quoins. C20 glazed door with overlight and 16-pane sashes with projecting sills, all in alternating-block surrounds. 1st floor sill band. Stone eaves. Hipped roof with 2 corniced ridge stacks. In re-entrant angle of rear wing a canted porch with boarded and battened door, and stone pent roof. 16-pane sashes and similar detail throughout.
